Culture vs Lifestyle

How do they differ?

- Lifestyle is visible (food, clothes, consumer goods, music)
- Culture is less visible (attitudes, beliefs, values, behaviour, communication)

Rituals and tribes

- What kind of ritual is it?

- The process of learning the culture is longer the process of learning the language
- It follows the pattern prescribed by our cultural group; becomes natural and programmed
- We don't have total freedom of choice in our behaviour
- Our actions are rule governed, automatic and unconsious
- Our behaviour is ritualised but we are not aware of that
- · Our culture regulates our behaviour

Stereotypes

- They reduce diversity
 - absolutely everyone in that culture is the same
- They reduce complexity
 - culture can be described with only small set of characteristics

Sum up

- 1. Know what culture you belong to
- Understand that culture is dominant; it influences the way you act, see, feel, do, interact, behave
- 3. You are a member of culture which regulates your behaviour
- Don't make assumptions about people's culture based on their ethnicity or nationality

- Don't draw conclusions about person's culture based on some aspects of their lifestyle
- Don't assume that when you see something familiar in another culture that it has the same meaning and significance as in your culture

- Accept cultural diference as reality; underneath people of the world can be profoundly different
- 8. Don't make the mistake of thinking that your culture is more complex than others
- Allow yourself to like and dislike aspects of other cultures, but don't condemn entire cultures

- 10. Remember that when you judge another culture you are probably using your own culture's standards
- Godwill and tolerance are a good start but not enough; you need knowledge, awarness and skill to improve intercultural communication
- 12. Your aim is to be a more skilled communicator and not a better person

Sum up

- 13. It is always possible to succeed in intercultural communication
- 14. Don't generalise when you meet someone from another culture whom you don't like
- 15. Stereotyping is inevitable but can't be the only basis for your interpretations.
